
More new changes on the way at Kettle Creek!

2025 is becoming a transformative year here at Kettle Creek and Monroe County Conservation District. In addition to new staff and management changes, we are also updating our building's entryway and our indoor and outdoor exhibits for your educational enjoyment!

The main entrance to the EE Center is still under construction but we are excited to unveil our new, unique design—including a new Pennsylvania Native Species pond with glass viewing window—once it is completed. We are looking at a potential July completion date. Our guest entrances are still limited to

completion date. Our guest entrances are still limited to the top parking lot ramp along the left side of the building and our center lot entrance "technical services" downstairs entrance. We've also spruced up our wooden exterior with a fresh coat of stain.

Work has also begun on the construction of a new informational kiosk as an Eagle Scout project. We would like to thank Nelson Figueroa for taking on that task. The new kiosk is being constructed at the far end of our parking lot at the start of the trail that heads up to the Mattioli Pavilion and Lilliana's Nature Discovery Area.



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Our Discovery Area will also be gaining a new element this summer—a hanging scale toy, so kids can strengthen their concepts of weight, balance, and cause-and-effect relationships while also gaining hand-eye coordination and estimating skills. Thank you to PA Water Environment Association for this!

Finally, we are eager to introduce some new indoor exhibits and elements in our EE Center. Our lobby area now includes "Science on a Sphere," an interactive global projection screen display that can model hundreds of different ecological conditions and global phenomena, including climate change trends, migration patterns, disease outbreaks, and other natural and human impacts on our planet. And you can visit other planets too!

Our new colorful Critter Room features a Magnetic Ball Wall, a great STEM activity where children can build and experiment with pathways for balls to follow using magnetic components. These components, like tubes, ramps, and spinners, attach to the wall using magnets, allowing for creative ball routes and hands-on learning.

You may also recognize some of our older Critter Room elements that have since been updated, along with a new cozy reading-nook structure. And we still have some more new educational wall displays on the way so stay tuned!

Kettle Creek Environmental Fund Update

The Kiplinger Retirement Report recently provided information about charitable giving in the U.S. There are almost 1.5 million non-church charities in the United States, of which only 232,000 take in more than \$25,000 annually. This includes the Kettle Creek Environmental Fund (KCEF), which had an income in 2024 of \$95,500 (including some hefty one-time donations). Expenses for the Fund totaled approximately \$16,400; \$35,000 was donated to the EE Center. The remainder is currently being held in interest-bearing checking



2025 Envirothon Results



Monroe County's winning team, "Peeping Toms"

Pleasant Valley High School once again took the top three spots at Monroe County's Envirothon Competition this year. Third place went to the **Sculpin Squad**, an all freshman team, while second place went to the **River Rascals**. The first place finishing **Peeping Toms** went on to compete at this year's state competition at Windber Park where they finished 9th out of 64 teams with a score of 426.7 out of 600. Delaware County took first place at the state competition, with a score of 551.3 points. Kettle Creek and Monroe County are very proud of our high school students and their consistent high-scoring teams year after year!

We would also like to acknowledge the achievements of our Junior Envirothon participants this year. Monroe County students from 5th - 8th grade were tested on their knowledge of local animals, trees, pond life, and climate change. Our winners for the 5th & 6th grade competition were **Moss Bosses** from Tobyhanna Elementary Center. The 7th and 8th grade competition resulted in an exciting *three-way tie* between two teams from Pocono Mountain West Junior High School and a team from Pleasant Valley Middle School. The tie breaker resulted with **Prickly Pine Cones** from Pocono Mountain West Junior High School coming out on top. The staff at Kettle Creek would like to acknowledge all the teams who participated this year for their hard work and dedication to learning about the natural world. We hope that the Junior Envirothon continues to inspire young learners to stay curious and keep exploring!

The past few months have been an exciting and energizing time for our tech team! We've had a season full of meaningful work, new connections, and hands-on environmental stewardship. From welcoming two new Erosion and Sediment Control technicians to participating in statewide webinars and Agricultural Conservation Conferences in Harrisburg, we've been quite busy!

Behind the scenes, we've been hard at work inspecting and reviewing construction sites to protect local ecosystems, all while planning a variety of public events and long term projects like the River of the Year Festival, the 2025 Monroe County Water Quality Study, a Tap-Talk at Blue Ridge Winery (see right), and several adult education programs focused on conservation.

Spring also saw us out in the field—quite literally—planting over 400 native trees across state game lands and

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Proudly Introducing our New Resource Conservation Specialists: Lena Campisi and Geoff Ioannidis

Working in the resource conservation industry can be a very demanding endeavor. We at the Monroe County Conservation District feel very fortunate to attract such high-quality people to fill these sometimes underappreciated positions—people willing to go above and beyond to ensure we protect Monroe County's valuable natural resources to the best of our ability while balancing the need for necessary growth and sustainable development within the county. We asked our two new District technical staff to share a little bit about themselves and why they choose to do this vital work.



"I'm so excited to join the incredible team at Monroe County Conservation District as a Resource Conservation Specialist!

A natural passion for the environment and curiosity about how the world works led me to pursue a bachelor's degree in Earth and Environmental Science from Wilkes University, with a focus in paleoclimatology and geochemistry.

I've been involved in environmental resource protection through work as an environmental contractor and pursued my passion in education prior to entering a master's program. During my master's, I was a big advocate for community involvement and community-building within my department, particularly for others in the LGBTQ community. Most recently, I was an education assistant with New York States Division of Lands and Forests and was responsible for developing outreach materials to better inform landowners about stewardship and the history of indigenous land management practices to dispel misinformation about the effects of forestry practices.

I'm passionate about keeping our lands healthy and protecting the integrity of our one and only home for future generations and all living things. Getting to help people understand how they can protect our shared resources is particularly rewarding and I'm looking forward to serving my community through future outreach opportunities.

Outside of work I enjoy hiking and camping, foraging, reading, tending to my garden, fostering dogs, and finding events that build community in my local area."
